About Responsive Inspections

A responsive inspection, performed by an RHRA inspector, is a physical inspection of a licensed retirement home. A responsive inspection is conducted when RHRA receives information that the licensee may have failed to meet the standards of the *Retirement Homes Act, 2010* or its regulations (the "*RHA*"). An inspection being conducted does not infer that an allegation is substantiated or that a contravention of the RHA has occurred. A licensee is required to report to RHRA if they suspect harm or risk of harm to a resident. During a responsive inspection, an RHRA inspector may observe the operations of the home, interview relevant individuals, review records and other documentation, and determine whether the licensee's management and staff have followed mandatory policies and practices designed to protect the welfare of residents.

Following a responsive inspection, the RHRA inspector prepares a draft inspection report which is sent to the licensee. The draft report may include instances where the licensee has failed to meet the standards of the *RHA*. If included, the licensee can respond to these instances and is strongly encouraged to inform RHRA of its plans to meet the standards of the *RHA*.

Following the draft report, the RHRA inspector prepares this final inspection report, incorporating any response from the licensee with their plans to meet the standards of the *RHA*. The most recent final inspection report must be posted in the home in a visible and easily accessible location. All final inspection reports from the previous two years must also be made available in an easily accessible location in the home. The licensee must provide a copy of this report to the home's Residents' Council, if one exists.

In addition to inspection reports, RHRA may provide information to a licensee to encourage improvements of their current practices.

If there is a serious incident or the licensee repeatedly does not meet the required standards, RHRA may take further action.

Concern(s)

During a responsive inspection, an inspector will focus primarily on the concern(s) which prompted the inspection and may take various actions to determine whether the licensee is compliant with the RHA in relating to the concern(s). Any findings of non-compliance identified in relation to these concerns are listed below.

Concern #1: CON-6956-Neglect

RHRA Inspector Findings

The RHRA conducted an inspection in response to an allegation of neglect involving a resident of the home. The Inspector interviewed staff, resident family, and reviewed home documentation. The Inspector was unable to substantiate a finding of neglect. The Inspector did review the resident's assessment and the plan of care. There is a requirement that if a resident receives care service the plan must be based on the residents needs and preferences. The plan of care must be approved by a Regulated Health Professional and the resident or their substitute decision maker. The plan of care must be revised should a resident care needs change or the care services provided are not effective. Further, there is a requirement that if a resident receives care services from an external care provider, details of that service and the goals of the services are to achieve must be included within the plan of care. The Licensee failed to complete a resident's plan of care as prescribed. There is a requirement that staff who provide direct care services to residents must be trained annually on those care services. The inspection showed that staff providing direct care to a resident had not been trained annually for assistance with bathing, assistance with personal hygiene, assistance with ambulation, continence care, or assistance with dressing. The Licensee failed to ensure staff were trained as prescribed.

Outcome

The Licensee provided information indicating that corrective action was being taken, however, further action must be taken to achieve compliance with all areas outlined in the finding. RHRA to confirm compliance by following up with the Licensee or by inspection.

Additional Findings

During a responsive inspection, an inspector may observe areas of non-compliance that are not related to the concern(s) which prompted the inspection. In these cases, an inspector may cite the home for these contraventions at the time of this inspection. In addition, an inspector may follow-up on findings of non-compliance from previous inspections. Where the licensee is unable to demonstrate they have come into compliance or maintained compliance, an inspector may cite the home for these repeat contraventions at the time of this inspection.

The inspector has verified that at the time of this report, the licensee was able to demonstrate that the following areas have come into compliance.
