About Responsive Inspections

A responsive inspection, performed by an RHRA inspector, is a physical inspection of a licensed retirement home. A responsive inspection is conducted when RHRA receives information that the licensee may have failed to meet the standards of the *Retirement Homes Act, 2010* or its regulations (the “*RHA*”). An inspection being conducted does not imply that an allegation is substantiated or that a contravention of the *RHA* has occurred. A licensee is required to report to RHRA if they suspect harm or risk of harm to a resident. During a responsive inspection, an RHRA inspector may observe the operations of the home, interview relevant individuals, review records and other documentation, and determine whether the licensee’s management and staff have followed mandatory policies and practices designed to protect the welfare of residents.

Following a responsive inspection, the RHRA inspector prepares a draft inspection report which is sent to the licensee. The draft report may include instances where the licensee has failed to meet the standards of the *RHA*. If included, the licensee can respond to these instances and is strongly encouraged to inform RHRA of its plans to meet the standards of the *RHA*.

Following the draft report, the RHRA inspector prepares this final inspection report, incorporating any response from the licensee with their plans to meet the standards of the *RHA*. The most recent final inspection report must be posted in the home in a visible and easily accessible location. All final inspection reports from the previous two years must also be made available in an easily accessible location in the home. The licensee must provide a copy of this report to the home’s Residents’ Council, if one exists.

In addition to inspection reports, RHRA may provide information to a licensee to encourage improvements of their current practices.

If there is a serious incident or the licensee repeatedly does not meet the required standards, RHRA may take further action.

Concern(s)

During a responsive inspection, an inspector will focus primarily on the concern(s) which prompted the inspection and may take various actions to determine whether the licensee is compliant with the RHA in relation to the concern(s). Any findings of non-compliance identified in relation to these concerns are listed below.

Concern #1: CON-1706-Abuse**RHRA Inspector Findings**

The Licensee reported an incident of witnessed resident to resident physical abuse to the RHRA. As part of the response to the report, the Inspector reviewed related documents including staff training records, the Licensee's policies, resident records and interviewed relevant individuals. The Inspector found that the Licensee immediately initiated their zero tolerance of abuse and neglect policy; however, the directives of the policy were not fully followed as the residents and/or their substitute decision-makers were not notified of the results of the investigation immediately or at all. In addition, the Inspector found that the Licensee failed to fully follow the directives of their behaviour management policy as there was insufficient evidence of any developed, implemented or documented strategies, interventions or techniques to prevent and address behaviours of a resident that poses a risk to other residents in the home including strategies for monitoring the resident.

Outcome

The Licensee submitted a plan to achieve compliance by Wednesday September 25, 2024. RHRA to confirm compliance by following up with the Licensee or by inspection.

Concern #2: CON-2131-Complaints**RHRA Inspector Findings**

While conducting this inspection, the Inspector made a finding unrelated to the purpose of the inspection. The Inspector found evidence through a review of documentation in the home that in January and February 2024, three complaints were made by residents in the home and there was no evidence to support the complaints were investigated/managed and documented as per the legislation and the Licensee's complaints policy. The Licensee failed to ensure their complaints policy was implemented and followed.

Outcome

The Licensee submitted a plan to achieve compliance by Monday September 23, 2024. RHRA to confirm compliance by following up with the Licensee or by inspection.

Concern #3: CON-2132-Abuse**RHRA Inspector Findings**

While conducting this inspection, the Inspector made a finding unrelated to the purpose of the inspection. The Inspector found evidence through a review of documentation in the home and interviews with staff that a resident reported an incident of alleged financial abuse to the Licensee in January 2024; however, there was no evidence to support the allegation was investigated or that it was reported to the RHRA as required.

Outcome

The Licensee has advised it has taken corrective action to achieve compliance. RHRA to confirm compliance by following up with the Licensee or by inspection.

Concern #4: CON-2164-Emergency Plan

RHRA Inspector Findings

While conducting this inspection, the Inspector followed up on previous areas of non-compliance related to testing of the home's emergency plan and found the Licensee again failed to test their pandemic and epidemic plan on an annual basis as required.

Outcome

The Licensee has advised it has taken corrective action to achieve compliance. RHRA to confirm compliance by following up with the Licensee or by inspection.

Additional Findings

During a responsive inspection, an inspector may observe areas of non-compliance that are not related to the concern(s) which prompted the inspection. In these cases, an inspector may cite the home for these contraventions at the time of this inspection. In addition, an inspector may follow-up on findings of non-compliance from previous inspections. Where the licensee is unable to demonstrate they have come into compliance or maintained compliance, an inspector may cite the home for these repeat contraventions at the time of this inspection.
