SUBJECT: **COVID-19 Vaccine Administration in Retirement Homes**

As you know, thanks to the dedication and partnership between public health units (PHUs), hospitals and retirement homes (RHs), we continue to make steady progress in offering a first vaccine dose to RH residents, staff and essential caregivers in Peel, Toronto, York and Windsor-Essex.

We are continuing to expand the vaccination program to all long-term care (LTC) homes and high-risk RHs across the province. The slowdown in Pfizer production has meant adjusting our plan to focus on residents and provide second doses where scheduled. However, our overall commitment has not changed, and we will reach the remaining staff and essential caregivers as quickly as possible as more supply is received.

We are confirming now that we are proceeding with our plan to immunize all **long-term care, high-risk retirement, and elder care residents** across Ontario as quickly as possible, before the provincial goal of February. This means that homes in the 14 PHUs where first doses have not yet been available will be on an accelerated vaccination program to reach residents.

Successful vaccine administration continues to be reliant on the readiness of homes. Your local PHU will be contacting you to establish site-specific delivery plans based on the latest supply information and focused approach. The Ministry for Seniors and Accessibility, together with the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of Long-Term Care, has developed an assessment checklist (Attachment 1) to help you in your planning and preparation.

Consent

Informed consent is a critical component of vaccine administration. As with all vaccines, consent must be secured in advance. If you have not already started, we recommend you initiate the completion of consent forms immediately so these are in place by the clinic date for each home. IT Readiness and Data Collection

In partnership with your local PHU, RHs should ensure that IT protocols are in place that define and confirm staff roles and responsibilities in data collection and reporting as well as ensuring that staff are appropriately trained in their assigned roles before your on-site clinic date. Training will be provided on data entry in the COVax-ON Vaccine Management System by the Ministry of Health. This tool is critical to enable a single, complete source of information and will make intake and process flow for clinics as efficient as possible.

Vaccine Administration

We would like to note that with recent regulatory amendments to the [Regulated Health Professions Act \(RHPA\)](#), nurses (both Registered Nurses and Registered Practical Nurses), pharmacists, pharmacy technicians, registered pharmacy students and pharmacy interns can also now administer a COVID-19 vaccine.

Media Protocol

To prioritize the safety and health of residents, please do not plan on-site media events. Please establish communication plans for media protocols and escalation protocols, as well as other contingency planning, as needed, with your local PHU.

Vaccine Uptake

Recently we shared some tips and strategies to help promote vaccine uptake and we are looking ahead to when we have more supply by working with partners to offer webinars for staff to address vaccine-related concerns. Please continue to share your best practices and areas where you think the ministry can further support vaccine uptake and vaccine confidence.
