

escalate concerns about homes to the RHRA

- A process to notify visitors that non-compliance with visitor policies may result in discontinuation of visits when risk of harm due to non-compliance is high.
- Dedicated areas for both indoor and outdoor visits to support physical distancing between residents and visitors.
- Protocols to maintain the highest of IPAC standards prior to, during and after visits.
- A list of visitors available for relevant staff to access.
- Protocols for record keeping of visitations for contact tracing purposes to be kept for at least 30 days.

must not exceed provincial limits for outdoor gatherings.

May visit a resident **indoors in a designated area, including in-suite** with the resident's permission. The number of individuals in a group must not exceed provincial limits for indoor gatherings.

May visit a resident **outdoors in a designated area.** Gatherings and events must align with provincial requirements of 100 people for outdoor gatherings in Step 3 may visit a resident indoors in a designated area, including in-suite with the resident's permission. The number of individuals in a group must not exceed provincial limits for indoor and outdoor gatherings, as applicable.

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Allowing Essential Visitors

An essential visitor is a person performing essential support services (e.g. Food delivery, inspector, maintenance, or health care services (e.g., phlebotomy) or a person visiting a very ill or palliative resident. In addition to a person visiting a very ill or palliative resident, there are two types of essential visitors:

Support Workers (Essential Visitor) An essential visitor who is brought into the home when there are gaps in services to perform essential services for the home or for a resident in the home.</p>	Any number of support workers may visit a resident in a home. EXCEPTIONS TO ISOLATION REQUIREMENT:

Recently recovered residents who are within 90 days from a prior lab confirmed COVID-19 infection are not required to be tested or placed in isolation on Droplet and Contact on arrival.

24-hour period, the transfer can occur, but the individual must remain in isolation in the home until a negative test result is received. If this test result is positive, the individual must continue their self isolation and the home must contact their local public health unit.

The resident must be placed in isolation on Droplet and Contact Precautions if the test result is pending. If the test result is negative, then isolation and Droplet and Contact Precautions can be discontinued. If the test is positive, isolation and Droplet and Contact precautions must be continued.

- For **partially immunized or unimmunized residents**, a lab-based PCR test is required at the time of admission/readmission and the resident must be placed in isolation on Droplet and Contact Precautions for a minimum of 10 days. A second negative lab-based PCR test performed on day 8 is required to discontinue isolation and Droplet and Contact Precaution on day 10; otherwise isolation and Droplet and Contact Precautions must be maintained until day 14.

- For recently recovered residents who are within 90 days (from the date the test was taken) from a prior lab-confirmed COVID-19 infection are not required to be tested or placed in isolation on Droplet and Contact Precautions on arrival.

A second negative lab -based PCR test performed on day 8 is required to discontinue isolation and Droplet and Contact Precaution on day 10; otherwise isolation must be maintained until day 14.

For recently recovered residents who are within 90 days (from the date the test was taken) from a prior lab confirmed COVID-19 infection are not required to be tested.


Exception for recently recovered residents: individuals who are within 90 days (from the date the test was taken) from a prior lab-confirmed COVID-19 infection and have recently recovered are not required to be tested or placed in isolation on Droplet and Contact precautions on admission/transfer. This applies to **both fully immunized and partially or unimmunized residents**.

Residents experiencing signs/symptoms of COVID-19 do not participate in communal dining unless the resident has tested negative for COVID-19 since onset.

If the home is below the immunization threshold, the following precautions apply:

- Permitted with physical distancing between diners during meals.
- Consistent seating of residents at the same table, strongly recommended.
- Masking when not eating/drinking required.

- Fully immunized Essential Caregivers may join a fully immunized resident during mealtime.
